Happy Holidays! Our chapter is nearing the end of 2022 with continued, strong recovery in several areas. As of 30 November, our paid membership totaled 58, and 28 have already paid dues for 2023. Membership for 2021 totaled 51 and 56 for 2020.

For the chapter's upcoming Christmas Dinner and Silent Auction, we have now received 56 reservations. This year very handily exceeds last year's registrations of 47, and pre-COVID 2019 attendance of 49. Our dinner venue at Achasta can accommodate 60-70, so there is still time to register and attend.

Two UNG alumni were inducted into the ROTC Hall of Fame this fall.

After serving as the UNG Corps of Cadets Brigade Commander, Lt Gen Mixon served 36 years on active duty in command positions from platoon to theater level. His final two assignments were as the CG of the 25th Inf Division and then as the CG of the US Army, Pacific.

Col Lord served more than 30 years, including stints as the PMS and Commandant of UNG Cadets. He served combat tours in RVN. His final active-duty assignment was as the Commander of the Army Garrison at Ft. McPherson.

Advent Reflections

My favorite Advent Hymn is "O Come, O Come, Immanuel." These haunting words trace back to the ninth century, composed by Monks to sing in the final weeks leading to the Christmas Mass. The most common translation and melody we use was adopted in the 19th century. I love the minor key that gives it a

unique sound when sung by a congregation.

These words speak to my heart and I hope will strengthen your Faith that we are not alone; we long for a redeemer to come, to set all things right and to make all things new.

CHRISTMAS DAY, DEC 25TH

Christmas is celebrated both as a sacred religious holiday and a worldwide cultural and commercial phenomenon. For two millennia, people around the world have been observing it with traditions and practices that are religious and secular in nature.



Christians celebrate Christmas Day as the birthday of Jesus, whose teachings form the basis of their religion.

In the early years of Christianity, Easter was the main holiday; the birth of Jesus was not celebrated until the fourth century when church officials decided to celebrate His birth.

UGA's Famous Arch



HEALTH NEWS

ALZHEIMER'S. An experimental drug has shown promising results against Alzheimer's in a large-scale clinical trial, slowing cognitive and functional decline 27%. The preliminary findings offered renewed hope for a class of previously used drugs, but with different protocols.

The medication, lecanemab, works by reducing tangled clumps of beta amyloid in the brain.

The lecanemab trial involved 1,800 participants with mild cognitive impairment. After six months, the medicated group had a "highly statistically significant" reduction in their cognitive decline compared with the placebo group.

While some experts caution that the benefits of lecanemab are likely to be

small; others say this is a "huge breakthrough".

Japanese pharma, Eisai, and its American partner, Biogen, will apply for accelerated regulatory approval, which could come as soon as early next year. *The Washington Post*

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MALARIA. Scientists at Oxford University have developed a malaria vaccine that has been called "world changing." Doctors have tried for over a century to make a vaccine for malaria, which kills more than 400,000 people annually, mostly African children.

In a trial involving 450 children, the injection R21 provided up to 80% protection against the deadly mosquito-borne disease. And, it's cheap to make, costing only a few dollars per treatment.

The Oxford team will soon begin seeking regulatory approval. If regulators give the okay, the world's largest vaccine manufacturer, the Serum Insitutute of India, will produce over 200 million doses a year. *BBC.com*

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DID YOU KNOW?

In a major retreat, Russia departed Kherson in mid-November, the only regional capital captured since invading Ukraine in February.
Russian troops blew up bridges across the Dnipro River behind them as they fled. The loss of the city is a huge blow to Putin, coming just weeks after he announced the "forever" annexation of Kherson and three other regions. Russian troops are growing restless and are openly complaining that their units are being used as cannon fodder in ill-

conceived combat plans and lack of support. *The Week Magazine*

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A block of 1,300 Starlink satellite internet units used for combat related operations suddenly went down across Ukraine last month "due to lack of funding." SpaceX was charging Ukraine \$3.25 million a month to keep over 25,000 of these space units connected, but their unpaid bill was almost \$20 million by the end of September. Starlink has been a "game-changing source of communication" for Ukraine's military ever since the invasion. *CNN.com*

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The U. S. national debt recently topped \$31 trillion for the first time, a milestone that comes amid rising interest rates that will increase the cost of carrying that debt. America's debt climbed \$7.9 trillion during the Trump administration and has increased another \$3.3 trillion during the first two years of the Biden administration. *CNN.com*

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The Pentagon will pay the travel costs of service members who choose to go to states where they can legally receive abortions. Secretary of Defense Lloyd Austin said "significant numbers of service members are based in states that limit or restrict abortion access, impeding our ability to recruit, retain, and maintain the readiness of a highly qualified force." *Politico*

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Low water levels in the Mississippi River caused by severe drought have left transport barges unable to pass, stalling delivery of crops from Midwestern farms, and other goods.



The Army Corps of Engineers is dredging the river to get traffic moving, as more than 2,500 stalled barges wait to pass downriver and other boats are left stranded in the mud. *CNN.com*

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Canada dropped all of its Covid restrictions for visitors to their country in mid-October. Tourists will no longer be required to show proof of vaccinations, get tested or quarantined, or wear a mask on planes or trains. *Canada Transportation Minister*

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The average price for a domestic round-trip flight during Thanksgiving was more than \$450. Prices for Christmas flights have already reached five-year highs and could rise above \$580 on average, according to travel booking site Hooper. *The New York Times*

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Despite a cutoff from Russia, the benchmark European price of natural gas fell below \$100 per megawatt hour, a level that is more than 70% below its record in August. European gas storage facilities have reached more than 90% of their capacity, while a warmer-than-usual October has kept consumption 20% below normal. *Financial Times*

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The housing slowdown continues. There were 130,000 fewer new homes sold in September than a year ago, a drop of 17.6%. It dropped 10.9% in August. Also, the median sales price of a newly constructed home was \$470,600, up nearly 14% from a year ago. *Yahoo Finance*

This summer was Europe's hottest on record, with temperatures soaring to 109 in France, 104 in U.K., and 102 in Germany. Fewer than 5% of



Barcelona beach homes in those countries have air conditioning. *Time*

The White House plans to tap 15 million more barrels of oil from the Strategic Petroleum Reserve to keep fuel prices down. The December release will be the last of the 180 million barrels authorized to be sold. The reserve is at its lowest level in nearly 40 years. The plan is to buy oil to refill the reserve once prices drop. *Politico*

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NASA, which had 19,000 employees and a federal budget of \$23.3 billion in 2021, estimates the total economic output linked to its missions and research at \$71.2 billion, supporting about 340,000 jobs in all 50 states and Washington, D.C. *CNBC.com*

Though Germany has twice California's population, Californa's gross domestic product is poised to hit \$3.5 trillion this year and overtake Germany's as the fourth-largest in the world after the U. S., China, and Japan. *Bloomberg*

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The average starting salary of a graduate with a bachelor's degree in 2021 was \$58,862, while a master's degree earned \$72,105 - - about 22% more, according to the National Association of Colleges and Employers. That's the smallest gap since NACE started collecting the data in 2015. *Bloomberg*

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In October, auto buyers paid an average of about \$45,600 for a new car or truck, down from a peak of \$46,175 in July. It's still 33% higher than before the pandemic, according to research firm J. D. Power. *The Wall Street Journal*

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Rivian issued a recall of nearly all its electric vehicles. The carmaker, backed by Amazon and Ford, has delivered 13,198 trucks since last year but recalled about 13,000 of them "due to a loose fastener that could cause the driver to lose steering control." Rivian's value fell by over \$2 billion due to concerns that the company may not be able to meet its 2023 production target. The company already cut its 2022 production target by half. *Reuters*

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Home Depot is in the process of verifying military discounts with just your phone number, similar to Lowe'. You must first enroll at homedepot.com/military/discount and complete your military verification. Once completed and approved, you should be set.

Spouses are also eligible but must set up their own separate account. (*This worked fine in the Dawsonville HD last week, but not in the Gainesville HD, so a learning curve is ongoing.*)

FILLING VA BAGS

On December 5th, dozen of members from various veterans and civic groups met in the Dahlonega American Legion to pack 150 goodie bags to go to the veterans in the VA Hospital in Atlanta.



This is an annual event that our chapter participates in and is spearheaded by our own Paul Wingo.

The bags, filled with socks, toiletries, snacks, masks, and writing materials, are warmly received by the veterans. Many of the vets have shared with us that this is the only gift they receive at Christmas.



The bags will be delivered on December 15th.
